From the Headmaster



Advances in technology in the last few decades have made it possible to communicate with friends anywhere in the world, not just by email, but on a number of social media platforms – Facebook, Twitter and so on. We can also fly directly from the Australian mainland non-stop to Europe, North America and anywhere in Asia. As some people say, the world is a smaller place today than in the past.

We know from the number of former students who now live and work in China, Jakarta, Singapore, Hong Kong and London, to name a few places, that there are students among our current enrolment who will find employment in international companies and be based from time to time in overseas locations. This is part of the reason why at Macarthur we always endeavour to instil an international perspective into our students. One way of achieving this is through opportunities for students to travel abroad on school tours; in recent times to Europe, Indonesia, Japan and Thailand. However, tours are not compulsory and not every student can take part in them.

A more important way that can benefit all students is to have people of other national, cultural and linguistic backgrounds visiting our school. Since 1992, Macarthur has enrolled full-time international students, who complete their education here while living with local families, before moving on to attend an Australian university. More recently, short-term study tours have introduced our students to people from a wide range of nations, including nations of Europe. The contribution our international students make is immeasurable, not only in the friendships that develop with Australian students, but also in their contribution to the academic standing of the school. One former international

student was Dux of the school and as recently as the 2018 HSC, an international student recorded the second highest ATAR score.

Since 2000, we have received visits by the students of Nihon University The Third High School in Tokyo, Japan. On each 14-day visit we ensure that their programme includes time to interact with classes in our Junior School, who are always delighted to meet the Japanese students.

As well as the English lessons they engage in, they also interact with students of their own age, visiting classrooms and participating in sporting competitions.

This brings me to the recent 2019 visit by the students and staff of Nihon University The Third High School, during the year of the school's 90th birthday celebrations. Once again, the visit was a wonderful success, with many new friendships made and intercultural understanding enhanced. However, this year's visit was even more important because the tour group was accompanied by Mr Arai, the Headmaster of the school, and Mr Shibata, the Deputy Headmaster. I should also mention that the group was once again accompanied by Mr Norio Suzuki, who has accompanied students on visits to Macarthur more than 20 times and is a valued friend to many members of staff.

During the visit by Mr Arai and Mr Shibata, discussions were held on how our schools can have an even closer relationship through interschool visits and teacher exchanges. The results of these discussions are described in more detail in the article about our international programme on Page 5.

Finally, and although I have already written at length about it in *The School Bulletin*, I would like to mention again the performance of *Les Misérables* by our students in August. Although the performance season is over, vivid memories remain, especially for those students who were involved as performers, musicians or backstage and technical support. Once again, I acknowledge the enormity of an undertaking like this, which could only be achieved through the dedication of Mrs Nadine James as Producer and Director, Dr Rebecca Bennison as Musical Director and Mr Kent Palmer as Technical Director, together with the support of countless teaching and support staff. I congratulate all of the students for their fine performances, efficient backstage work and outstanding technical support. Well done!

Macarthur Learning



The Year 5 and 6 Agriculture Club

An outstanding feature of Macarthur Anglican School is the Macarthur Show Team for students in Years 7 to 12. *The School Bulletin* often details the amazing results our students achieve in local shows and the Sydney Royal Easter Show each year, with many students winning ribbons for placings in the various events.

Just as important, as a preparation ground for the Show Team, is the Year 5 and 6 Agriculture Club. Under the guidance of Science and Agriculture teacher Mrs Helen Glover, the club operates on two days per week, with Year 6 meeting during the lunch break on Mondays and Year 5 meeting on Fridays. Beginning with smaller, easily handled animals, the students feed and water the school's chickens and learn how to care for them, including how to wash and groom them ready for showing. This involves gently washing the chickens in a small tub in warm water. They learn to gently clean their feet and combs with a soft toothbrush to get them looking their best.

Each year the school's chickens are entered in the Camden Show and students are always excited to see how they perform. This year, the club entered a team of six chickens and were rewarded with a third placing in the team event and overall Champion Rooster with their Silkie called Stanley.

Apart from working with poultry, members of the Agriculture Club also begin their involvement with larger animals, initially helping with each year's flock of newborn lambs. As well, they try their hand with growing vegetables with the help of Mr Paul McCarthy, the school's Farm Assistant.

This year, members of the Agriculture Club began involvement in a new activity called the Birds in Schools Project, which aims to engage students in the scientific process, by investigating and monitoring the birds and their habitat in our school grounds. The ultimate aim is to develop and implement an action plan related to improving the biodiversity of our school. Students will be taught how to identify birds in our local area, leading to the development of an atlas defining areas of habitat.

The Agriculture Club is open to all interested students in Years 5 and 6 after they complete a Safety Induction Course. It is one of the school's most worthwhile activities in which a student in this age group can be involved.

Macarthur International

Like many independent schools across Australia, Macarthur Anglican School has an active, ever-evolving International Student Programme. Initially, this consisted of a small number of international students, mostly from Hong Kong, then later expanded to include mainland China and several other Asian nations such as Indonesia and Thailand. Apart from the enrolment of international students from these countries, the programme has evolved in more recent times to include several short-term study tours by students from a wider range of countries, including students from Europe.

A very important aspect of the International Student Programme is the link school arrangements we have with Nihon University The Third High School in Tokyo, Japan, and the Lévay József Református Gimnázium in Miskolc, Hungary. The relationship with the first of these schools has been built on annual visits by a group of Nihon students in August each year, plus a small number of visits by groups from Macarthur. The relationship with Lévay József has been built mostly on student and teacher exchanges on a yearly basis. Many students have enjoyed learning about language, the respective cultures of each country and building friendships across the world. Teachers from both schools have also been involved in exchanges where they have appreciated the sharing of teaching and learning methods.

The most recent group of Nihon University The Third High School students to visit Macarthur, were accompanied by The Headmaster, Mr Arai, and the Deputy Headmaster, Mr Shibata. Their visit was part of the school's 90th year celebrations and also coincided with the completion of 20 years of association with Macarthur. During the





visit, a Sister School Agreement was signed which will expand the relationship between our two schools. "As part of that agreement," the Headmaster said, "Nihon University The Third High School has confirmed their desire to host Macarthur students as part of the Snowsports Tour we arrange from time-to-time and also to host our students during possible future cultural tours".

In addition, a Teacher Exchange or Visitation Programme will allow Macarthur teachers to experience exchange opportunities with teachers from Japan. This is an outstanding opportunity for Macarthur teachers to gain an intimate view on the way a Japanese school operates and to experience life in urban Japan. There will also be the chance of daily contact with Japanese teachers who will spend varying periods at our school, observing the

teaching methods and curriculum and comparing it with their

own teaching experience.





Personal Development, Health and Physical Education

This subject, known colloquially as PDHPE, is a prominent feature of the Macarthur Anglican School curriculum. It is a compulsory subject in all year levels up to Year 10 and an elective course in Years 11 and 12. Thirty eight students have chosen to continue their study of PDHPE as an elective subject in 2019. PDHPE is more than just an outdoor activity, as the brief descriptions below make abundantly clear.

In the Junior School years, research has shown that there is a positive association between physical activity and the cognitive, social, emotional, physical and spiritual components of health. Regular participation in physical activity during these years and during adolescence is important for promoting a lifelong positive attitude towards a healthy lifestyle. The syllabus for this stage of learning covers Active Lifestyle, Dance, Games and Sports, Growth and Development, Gymnastics, Interpersonal Relationships, Personal Health Choices and Safe Living.

A new syllabus for Years 7 to 10, which commenced in 2019, has a focus on Life Skills, specifically Health, Wellbeing and Relationships, Movement Skill and Performance, and Healthy, Safe and Active Lifestyles. The syllabus provides material for teaching several units on topics such as Anytime Activity, Managing Yourself, Developing Boundaries, Do I or Don't I and case studies about students with disabilities. Year 10 students attended the Stand Tall event. 'Committed not just motivated' is the message that resonates with the students who attend. The Stand Tall programme aims to inspire secondary students to stand tall for what is right, for positive choices, for friendship, for resilience and against bullying. The minds of our students are challenged, and the importance of setting goals is emphasised, as students are encouraged to set 'audacious' goals for their lives with a healthy disregard for what others may tell them is impossible.





The senior PDHPE syllabus is a demanding course covering health issues in Australia, including a focus on groups experiencing health inequalities, and the challenges of maintaining health throughout a growing and ageing population. Students also study the factors affecting sporting performance, such as energy systems, nutrition and psychology. Sports Medicine is another exciting topic, looking at sports injuries and rehabilitation.

Macarthur provides opportunities for students to learn about and practise ways of adopting and maintaining a healthy, productive and active life. The PDHPE programme continues to challenge the minds and bodies of Macarthur students as they learn through movement experiences that are challenging and enjoyable. Health lessons allow students to explore issues that are likely to impact their health and wellbeing in the future, including physical activity, mental health, drug use, sexual health, nutrition, supportive relationships, personal safety, gender roles and discrimination. Health issues that appear in later life are also relevant topics for study, due to the possibility that they may impact the family and other significant adults in students' lives. While setting goals is important, students are led to understand that failure is sometimes part of the process of growing, and that we are not defined only by what we achieve but also by the journey to become who we are.



History Tour 2019

The completion of the 8th History Tour to Europe this year gives some idea of just how popular this opportunity is for Macarthur Anglican School students. The tour is a much-anticipated fixture in the calendar, allowing students to see historic sites in Europe, which creates an appetite to see more beyond the end of school.

While many of the sites are included in each tour, there are slight differences from one tour to the next, dictated by a variety of circumstances, some of which are quite unexpected. For example, one tour had to cope with the party's luggage going astray. Another was extended when a volcanic eruption in Iceland delayed all flights. This year, the disastrous fire in the Cathedral of Notre Dame ruled out a visit to this 12th Century architectural icon. New experiences in this tour included a trip to Giverny to see Monet's house and garden, then to Rouen, to avoid the Yellow Vest protestors in Paris. The group also visited the Canadian WWI Memorial at Vimy Ridge for the first time.

This list of well-known sites gives an idea of just how broad the experience was and how busy the group of 34 students were to take it all in.

In Rome, there were visits to the Colosseum, the Roman Forum, Vatican City, St Peter's Basilica, the Sistine Chapel and the Pantheon. Pompeii and Naples are rich in archaeological sites, where students took a guided tour of the ancient streets, ruins and excavations. They saw the city centre of Naples and amazing Greek and Roman antiquities at the Archaeological Museum.

Moving on to Berlin, students visited the Berlin Wall, the Brandenburg Gate, the Reichstag, the Holocaust Memorial, Checkpoint Charlie and the Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp from WWII. In Paris, there were visits to Les Invalides, the Arc de Triomphe, Le Tour Eiffel, the Palace of Versailles, Montmartre, the Sacré-Coeur Basilica and the Louvre, followed by the diversion to Giverny and Rouen.

On the Western Front, there were visits to Amiens, Albert, the Lochnagar Crater, the Pozières Memorial, Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery, Arras and Vimy Ridge. Crossing the English Channel from Calais by ferry to London, students visited Trafalgar Square, Buckingham Palace, Piccadilly Circus, the London Eye, the Tower of London, The London Dungeon, Westminster Abbey, St Paul's Cathedral, the British Museum and the Imperial War Museum. What an experience!





Digital Technology in the Junior School Classroom

In the last issue of *Tartan Ties*, the Head of Junior School, Mrs Estelle Stelzer, explained the impact a new Science and Technology Syllabus will have when it is implemented. Implementation is now under way, so Mrs Stelzer has provided this information on how digital technology has become a central feature of classrooms at Macarthur.

Technology has drastically changed the way we live and the way in which we teach and learn. We are so firmly entrenched in the digital age that most primary school children today don't know a world without Google, iPhones and the internet. Since the 1980s, when computers first appeared in front of primary school students, they have been used for a few core purposes: word processing, researching information, adding an audio-visual element to learning and playing 'educational' games. Computers were originally set up in specialised 'labs' and accessed as an add-on to the classroom curriculum. However, within the last few years we have seen a radical change in the way technology has been integrated into the classroom.


Technology helps us move away from a traditional industrial model of education and towards educating 21st Century learners who are creative problem-solvers, and who are adept seekers, rather than possessors, of knowledge. Technology is no longer relegated to laboratories but embedded in daily classroom routines. With the implementation of the new K-6 Science and Technology syllabus, students at Macarthur have embraced the opportunity to participate in developing innovative ideas and solutions in response to questions they have about the world.

While digital technology involves the use of hands-on equipment such as blue-bots, spheros, Lego We-Do and other such devices, it also involves developing skills such as computational, scientific, systems and design thinking. These are explored within each stage of the children's learning and encourage students to question, manipulate, inquire and produce solutions to problems. Through knowledge and understanding of digital technologies, students are encouraged to become critical consumers of information and creative producers of digital solutions.





There will always be a place for a real, live teacher in the classrooms of the future regardless of advances in technology. Research has shown that the single biggest factor in student achievement is the teacher-student relationship. You can have an unlimited budget, a one-to-one device approach, continual internet connectivity and a suite of the latest and most engaging software, but the fact remains that without an expert teacher on hand to engage the students and scaffold their inquiry, learning is limited. Professional learning for staff in this area of digital technology will continue to be prioritised as changes and advances in technology arise, further developing our students as 21st Century learners.







Macarthur Stars

Several outstanding sportspeople have attended Macarthur Anglican School. Two young achievers in the world of cricket are Jade Errington of Year 12 and William Salzmann of Year 11.

Jade Errington was selected to compete at the Indoor Cricket
National Championships in Melbourne during July this year. This
was the fourth time that Jade has represented NSW Metro in Indoor
Cricket. The team went down in two challenging early encounters
against powerful Queensland and Victorian teams, before winning
their next five matches to reach the finals.

NSW Metro faced South Australia in the first Semi Final, securing an impressive 125 to 96 run victory. Jade scored 22 runs with a strike rate of 183.33 and took two wickets with the ball. Jade's team progressed to the Preliminary Final to face Queensland. After two losses to Queensland early in the tournament, the momentum shifted as NSW produced a scintillating performance, defeating Queensland 105 runs to 83 to secure their spot in the National Championships Grand Final against Victoria.

Victoria's very strong side remained undefeated throughout the National Titles. NSW Metro fought hard in the Grand Final, but it was Victoria who eventually secured a 104 to 77 run victory. Jade made 15 runs in the Grand Final at a strike rate of 115.38 and had the excellent bowling figures of two wickets for just one run from her two overs.

Jade was second highest run scorer in the Nationals tournament, compiling 175 runs in 11 games, at an average of 15.91 and a strike rate of 119.87. She was also the first-string wicketkeeper, along with being called on to pick up wickets at crucial times with the ball.

Jade, by statistics, was Player of the Match for three of the eleven games played during the Nationals and picked up her third Player of the Match Award in the Grand Final despite the loss, an outstanding achievement!

Jade has also been selected in the NSW Under 18 Outdoor Training Squad from which a team is selected for a National Tournament later this year.

William Salzmann is to be congratulated for the outstanding achievement of being selected in the Under 17 Cricket Australia XI. William earned his selection following an intensive training camp run by Cricket Australia at the National Cricket Centre in Brisbane in early July.

William caught the eyes of national selectors during February this year with some very strong performances with both bat and ball at the Under 15 National Championships in Queensland. William was a consistently dominant player in the NSW team that went through the National Championships undefeated.

In the Grand Final against Queensland, William scored an impressive 29 runs not out from just 15 deliveries, including three fours and a six. He also picked up a crucial wicket with the ball, as well as taking two catches to help secure the National Title for New South Wales.

Four days after the National Championships, William was announced as part of the Under 15 Australian Cricket Team.

A few months later William earned selection in the Under 17 Cricket Australia XI.

Les Misérables is a favourite musical of Producer and Director, Mrs Nadine James, as it is for many people around the world. She describes it as a challenging show to stage, requiring many capable vocalists and musicians.

Retirements

Mrs Sue McKell, who was featured in the last issue of *Tartan Ties*, was farewelled at the end of Autumn Term after 32 years of service to the school as a Uniform Shop consultant. Mrs McKell and her husband John have retired to a new home south of Nowra.

After commencing at Macarthur in 2012, the Reverend David Hayman retired as Chaplain at the end of Summer Term this year. Mr Hayman led Chapel services, taught Biblical Studies, coached Basketball teams and ran several co-curricular activities such as the Dads and Daughters weekends, Super-Cru Day Camps, Oasis Getaway weekends and the North Queensland Outreach for Year 6. Mr Hayman will continue in ministry closer to his home in the Southern Highlands.*

Mr Bruce Manning retired at the end of Autumn Term in June, after serving the school since 2010 as a bus driver and on grounds maintenance. Mr Manning has been a church pastor and, as a licenced electrician, was able to carry out a number of small electrical jobs for the school. His knowledge, skills and sense of humour will be missed by students and teachers alike.

Mr Larry Turner of the Grounds and Maintenance Department retired in August after serving the school since 2011. Mr Turner will also be missed by the school because of his trade skills in welding and repairing the school's maintenance machinery. Among many other jobs Mr Turner has done around the school, such as reconditioning mowers, parents should note the number of green and timber slat seats spread around the school, from the Transition and Kindergarten play area and the pick-up waiting area, to the Senior School recreation areas.

Caleb Foundation

The Headmaster also announced at the end of 2018 that Macarthur will be partnering with the Caleb Foundation for South Asia (calebaustralia.org.au) to form a link with the New Hope School, in Dhaka, Bangladesh. This work is now under way, allowing the school to serve and give generously in a direct and significant way that will benefit the students and teachers of New Hope School. Macarthur

is committed to providing \$7,000 per year to support New Hope School, with each of the six Houses aiming to raise at least \$700, and the balance coming from other school activities such as Happy Day. In August, the students heard from Pastor Colin, who described the work of the Caleb Foundation in supporting a total of nine schools and 23 pastors in Bangladesh, one of the poorest nations in the world.

Lifelong Learning

Macarthur encourages students to regard learning as a lifelong pursuit. A wonderful example is set by teachers who continue their own learning in order to increase their knowledge and expand their teaching skills. Of note is the example of Macarthur Science teacher, Dr Rachel D'Arcy, who recently completed a PhD degree. Her scientific research was titled *Chronic Kidney Disease in Non-Domestic Felines*, which involved research in the field of veterinary medicine, investigating kidney disease in big cats such as lions, tigers, cheetahs and snow leopards that live in Australian zoos. All of these are threatened species, underlining the importance of this work. Dr D'Arcy commenced her research in 2012 and was conferred with a PhD by the University of Sydney in 2018. In the course of her research, she visited eight zoos throughout Australia, sometimes being present during veterinary procedures on anaesthetised animals.

Junior Classes at Macarthur

While Macarthur Anglican School has now been operating for 35 years, junior classes educating children from Transition to Year 6 have only been in existence for just over 25 years. The Foundation School Council initially planned for a secondary, Year 7 to 12, independent Anglican school. However, by the early 1990s it was apparent that there was a need for junior classes, which would satisfy demand as the surrounding areas grew rapidly, and which would provide the advantage of a number of children entering Year 7, who were already steeped in the culture of Macarthur.

Initially, the demand for Kindergarten to Year 6 places was determined by conducting a survey among existing parents and the wider community. Tentatively, the School Council took the step of establishing in 1993 just three classes, a Kindergarten, a Year 5 and a Year 6. The school employed Mr Andrew McPhail as the Head of Junior School, Mr Richard Turnbull to teach Primary and Mrs Karen Oliver to teach Kindergarten. At this stage, the entire school was located in Richardson Road, Narellan. Interestingly, those first children to attend Macarthur in Kindergarten are now around 30 years of age.

Year by year, the Junior School grew, adding to the total enrolment of the school which reached almost 700 within a few years on the rather confined two-hectare site in Narellan. With the foresight of the School Council, a search began at the same time for a larger permanent site for the school, now expected to reach 1,000 enrolled students.

After 'filling in' every year level from Kindergarten to Year 6 within four years, growth continued by establishing two classes per year group. In addition, the Transition class for pre-Kindergarten children began in 1997. After senior classes transferred to Cobbitty in 1997, the Junior School continued at Narellan until 2005, when all classes were finally established at the school's present site.

In recent years, the Narellan site where Macarthur began was purchased by the Department of Education, which found that the buildings were not fit for their purposes and had them demolished. They have now built a new School for Specific Purposes (SSP) called Yandelora, catering for children with disabilities. Macarthur has already established an exciting partnership with Yandelora, which is described by Mrs Karyn Ingram in the Community section on Page 15. Through this partnership, Macarthur will maintain a link with the place where our school began.

The 'journey' of the Junior School has been an exciting development in the history of Macarthur as a Kindergarten to Year 12 school, providing high quality Primary and Secondary education, within a Christian framework. Ongoing expansion, with the opening of Exploring Tree Macarthur in 2018 and the impending development of the Integrated Studies Building, will ensure that future students of all ages will continue to learn in outstanding facilities.
